ALBATROSS OPEN '94

We survived another Albatross Open! The meet this year was held March 26th at the Fairland Aquatic Center in Laurel, Maryland. Over 210 swimmers registered for this meet — a whopping 24% increase over our total of 160 swimmers that registered in 1993. We raised over \$2,100. (That probably comes to about \$0.25 per hour for all the labor we put in.) It was a very good meet. One World Record and four National Records were bettered at the meet. A huge number of Montgomery Ancient Mariners participated either as swimmers or helpers.

A social followed the meet at the home of Tom Denes. Although slightly packed, most of the participants seemed to have a good time. Several special awards were distributed at the social. Susan Jones won the "Fastest Woman on the Water" award for posting a meet best time of 28.12 in the 50 m free. Jeff Roddin was named "Fastest Man on the Water" by virtue of his meet best 50 m free of 24.81. Emad Elshafei won the Versatility Award by swimming the fastest handicapped I.M. Emad posted a 2:16.81 and won without the benefit of a handicap. Bob Williams won the Consistency Award for coming the closest to his seed time in the 400 m free; Bob finished within 0.65 seconds of his seed time. (Bob's award was Lisa Berger's book Feathering Your Nest, a review of which will appear in the September Issue of OrnIthology Today).

We are already preparing for next year's extravaganza (only seven more months to go!). Hopefully, we'll be back at the MAC or maybe even at the new pool in Olney. ANCIENT MARINERS COMPETE IN WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Two Ancient Mariners (Dave Harmon and Tom Denes) and one Ancient Mariner grouple (Nick Olmos-Lau) competed in the Masters Long Course World Championships in the Montreal Olympic pool. Over 3,400 swimmers from over 40 countries participated in the meet.

Dave Harmon, age 44, experienced his lifetime first shave and cut off (keep reading) 20 seconds from his 400 meter free (5:45.42). He might have gone faster had not the drag from all the band-aids slowed him down! Dave also swam the 50 free (29.71), 200 free (2:36.94), and the 5 kilometer open water swim (1:26.39). His best placing was 13th in the 5 km swim.

Tom Denes also had a good meet. His proudest accomplishment was, after four years of trying, finally breaking 2:20 in the 200 free....by 6 seconds! He swam a 2:14.29. He also swam the 400 free (4:49.33), the 200 fly (2:36.32), the 100 fly (1:06.56), and the 50 fly (30.28). His best placing was 8th in the 200 fly.

Nick Olmos-Lau (45–49) had a very good meet as well. He was most pleased with his 5 km swim (1:26:40) where he cut an amazing 15 minutes off his previous best time! Nick also swam the 400 l.M. (6:49.47), 200 fly (3:35.02), 200 back (3:17.97), and the 200 breast (3:26.54). His best placing was 15th in the 200 fly.

A REALLY ANCIENT MARINER CROSSES ENGLISH CHANNEL

One of the founding members of the Ancient Mariners, Eltan Friedman, recently fulfilled a lifelong dream; he swam the English Channel. Eltan, 41, crossed the 21 mile channel on July 1993 in 13 hours and 13 minutes. This was his second attempt to cross the channel. His first attempt, swum in rough conditions, was aborted after 16 miles. Eltan is the first Israeli citizen to cross the English Channel.

When asked what kept his mind from cracking during his long, grueling swim, he stated that he sustained himself by trying to recall the names of all of his former girlfriends. Although declining to be identified for this article, a former girlfriend of Eitan's has stated "Swimming is what Eitan did best."

USMS SHORT COURSE NATIONALS IN TEMPE, ARIZONA

Five Ancient Mariners made the trip to this year's USMS Short Course Nationals in Tempe, Arizona. Jeff Roddin, Jason Crist, Clay Britt and Nick Nevid represented the men while Renatta Fischetti was the lone woman to make the long journey out West. This year's meet featured 100+ degree heat to accompany the scorching swimming times done in the pool. Nearly 2,000 swimmers were entered in the meet making it one of the largest and most competitive ever.

The four Ancient Mariner men took first place in the 25+ age group in the 200 Medley Relay (1:35.5) and eight in the 200 Free Relay (1:28). Clay Britt won the 100 Back (:50.81) for the third year in a row in the 30-34 age group. Clay also placed 2nd in both the 50 Back (:23.88, :23.60 lead-off split on relay) and 50 Free (:21.40), 3rd in the 100 Fly 52.05 and 6th in the 50 Fly (:23.39). Jeff Roddin (25-29) took 2nd in the 200 IM (1:56.76), 4th in the 100 Fly (:50.76) and 100 Back (:52.94), 5th in the 50 Fly (:23.31) and 7th in the 50 Free (:21.79, :21.47 lead-off split on relay). Jason Crist (30-34) scored in both the 200 IM (2:02.12) where he came in 9th and in the 200 Fly (2:01.42) where he came in 6th. Nick Nevid (30-34) scored in both the 100 and 200 Breaststrokes (1:02.86, a 7th place finish, and 2:20.40, for 8th place, respectively).

Renatta Fischetti (55–59) scored points in 4 of her 5 events. She placed 7th in both the 50 Breast (:50.07) and 200 Breast (4:04.14), 8th in the 200 Free (3:22.45), 9th in the 100 Free (1:31.93) and 12th in the 50 Free (:38.59).

Those who have never been to Short Course Nationals may want to consider making a trip to Fort Lauderdale for next year's meet to the held in mid/late May. Fort Lauderdale is home of the International Swimming Hall of Fame. In the meantime good luck to the Ancient Mariners competing in the various local meets and Long Course Nationals this August in Buffalo!

RESTON MASTERS 2-MILE LAKE SWIM

Twelve swimmers participated in the Reston Masters 2–Mile Lake Swim on May 29th.
